The Mountains Of Amazonas are the birthplace of the mighty Amazon River and the legendary rainforest that fills its basin. Here in the Peruvian Andes, Stig Dalström, the Wild Orchid Man, searches for rare and unknown orchids. In his quest, he discovers the mysteries of this region: ancient ruins left by unknown people, one of the world's tallest waterfalls – unknown outside of the local village until 2005 and, of course, exquisite new orchids. The viewer travels with Stig and filmmaker Darryl Saffer as they explore jungles and deserts, meet the strange creatures that inhabit this remote region, and uncover the great threats to this unique ecosystem. In spite of floods, landslides, giant spiders and a host of biting insects and hostile plants, The Wild Orchid Man valiantly maintains his composure to take the audience on this enlightening, educational and entertaining journey.



MAY SPEAKER: WEYMAN BUSSEY

We Had a Good Time and Won Vanilla Beans

Our June speaker, Weyman Bussey achieved his goal and presented an excellent lesson on Native Mexican Species. He used the perfect icebreaker: balloons. We reverted into playful children squealing and screeching our air filled orbs and then popping them on command. He introduced the relevant orchid vocabulary and activated our background knowledge: SLATE, the five ways orchids grow in the wild (Saprophyte, Lithophyte, Aquatic, Terrestrial and Epiphyte) and orchid WANTS (Water, Air, Nutrients, Temperature and Sunshine). He reminded us that Florida is *not tropical* because it does not lie within the Tropic of Capricorn and Tropic of Cancer. Weyman recommended researching habitat and conditions before adding Mexican orchids into our collection, as many prefer higher elevations.

As Weyman guided us through the tropical region of Mexico, the FLOS lecture hall became his classroom. He repeatedly reminded us to "raise our hands" to answer his many genus and species questions. Like a master teacher, he rewarded his master students with dried vanilla beans. Some of the species and genus correctly identified were Lycaste consobrina, Oncidium cebolleta, trichocentrum, sphacelatum and anreanum, Catasetum integuerrimum,

Myrmecophila christinea, grandiflora, and galliantana, Encyclia tampensis, citrine, mariae, aromatica and alata, Laelia aurea, and gouldiana, as well as Brassia verrucosa and Brassavola cucullatta. Everyone had a great time participating in the lecture and nearly everyone left with a vanilla bean. (Gigi Granger)

Q. Flowering Vanilla

Have you any suggestions to induce a Vanilla planifolia to bloom?

My plant is growing well at the warm (80° to 85° F) end of my greenhouse, receives ample light at least six hours a day and is fertilized on a weekly basis. It has twined itself up a center support and has attached itself to the center ridge of the greenhouse. Is this species a notoriously shy bloomer? *Tom Capranica*

A. Given enough light and space - and I do mean space - vanilla vines will flower regularly. They require at least as much light as cattleyas, and will grow to completely enclose your greenhouse eventually. We had one at my former place of employment

that had to have been in aggregate more than 500 feet long that did not flower until we had scrubbed the roof well (the fiberglass was 20 years or more old at the time). Your plant should flower by the time it is nearing 20 feet, possibly this coming spring. Ned Nash
