## FEBRUARY SPEAKER:

#### HYLA LEVINE BY GIGI GRANGER

Blooming and Caring for Our New Orchids

Our speakers for February were from Green Barn Orchids: Hyla Levine and Silas Trevena. The duo taught us how to re-bloom our orchids and how to provide basic care.

Hyla began with repotting Phaleanopsis. Her moist potting mix is 50% coconut core, hydroton or manmade lava rock, firbark and sponge rock. Phaleanopsis prefer low light like on a patio or close to a building. Phals can be picky about watering. Floppy leaves will indicate either too much or not enough water. Start with watering every five days. Never water the crown to prevent crown rot. Always water and drain roots thorouhly. Ice cubes **do not** provide



sufficient water for Phals. Repot phals every year in clear plastic pots not clay. Do not repot in cooler days of the years and wait until the plant has finished blooming.

Hyla recommends using clay pots for Cattleyas and Dendrobiums. They require a drier mix because they store water in their psuedobulbs. She uses a mix of hydroton, charcoal and coconut husk chips or she mounts on a tree fern plack. Mount flat, upright to allow the roots to use gravity to attach firmly. Vanda and other mounted type of orchids can remain on their mounts and in baskets for years.

Orchids require good air circulation, water and food. Fertilize every week. Hyla uses a system of growth and bloom. She applies fertilizer formulated for growth, like Jack's, three weeks in a row and then a bloom booster. To further enhance root growth, Hyla likes to use Maxicrop, a seaweed supplement instead of Super Thrive. Super Thrive can mutate the flower if you overdo it.

Use a fungicide like Physan 20 to counteract bacteria and fungus growth during rainy season. Cinnamon powder, a natural fungicide, can help manage spot treatments but systemic treatment is recommended. Her big tip for blooming Vanda's is spray the spikes to prevent an infestation of thrips, which can quickly destroy the spikes. Ortho's Flower, Fruit and Vegetable Spray or an Orthene-based insecticide can help manage pests.

Silas Trevena demonstrated repotting and mounting orchids. He emphasized using potting clips on the rhizomes to secure orchids in their new pots. Use Nutricote, a long lasting supplement, commonly sold as Dynamite for new orchids, and again when repotting. He recommends a teaspoon per 6-inch pot. For mounted orchids attach fertilizer pouches to hanger. Finally, never use Osmacote on orchids it will burn them.

## Tips & Tricks for Better Growing and Happier Orchids By Keith Davis

Mix: no single mix will work for everyone. Experiment gradually... NEVER change your collection to something new all at one time. Tailor your mix to your conditions. A mostly inorganic mix is best. I like using sequoia bark, tree fem, aliflor, Stalite, sponge rock. Styrofoam peanuts, Orchiata (Monterrey pine bark), red lava rock, and charcoal. The primary purpose of the mix is to grow a great root system. Air and more air is needed for great roots. A sorry mix dictates when you have to repot. A good mix will last for many years and usually the plant outgrows the pot before the mix goes bad.

# The Genus *Broughtonia* by Chuck McCartney

For nearly two centuries, the genus *Broughtonia* included just one species, the widespread Jamaican *Broughtonia sanguinea*, first described as an *Epidendrum* by Olof Swartz in 1788. Then, in 1961, Jack Fowlie described a second species from western Jamaica as *Broughtonia negrilensis*. There is also a natural hybrid between the two, *Broughtonia X jamaicensis*, described in 1984. Thus, traditionally the genus was considered endemic to Jamaica.

On other islands in the Greater Antilles, however, there

grew four very similar species, but these were relegated to the separate genera *Cattleyopsis* and *Laeliopsis* based on rather minor anatomical differences. Modern DNA research has shown these genera to be so closely related to *Broughtonia* that the seven taxa (including the natural hybrid) now have been lumped into *Broughtonia* because the latter ge-



nus, described in 1813 by Robert Brown, has historic and taxonomic priority over *Laeliopsis* (John Lindley, 1853) and *Cattleyopsis* (Charles Lemaire, 1854).

Now that these seven taxa are in the same genus, the natural range of *Broughtonia* is more extensive. The former *Cattleyopsis* species

in Cuba, including the endemics Broughtonia cubensis and Broughtonia ortgiesiana, plus Broughtonia lindenii, which also occurs through much of the Bahamas. The former Laeliopsis domingensis is from the island of Hispaniola (Haiti and the Dominican Republic) and extends to Mona Island

between Hispaniola and Puerto Rico. The "Puerto Rico" distribution for this species, now *Broughtonia domingensis*, refers to the rare Mona Island populations, according to Puerto Rico orchid expert James D. Ackerman, Ph.D.
