Finally, the holiday party is a perfect place to strike up orchid conversations and get last minute winter advice. If you haven't booked your seat yet, there is still time and I am sure we can make room. I hope everyone and their orchids have healthy and happy holidays.

October Meeting

Preparing Orchids for FLOS Show

At our monthly meeting in November we were fortunate to have on loan from the West Palm Beach Judging Center, 4 wonderful judges to help us get our plants and exhibits ready for upcoming shows. The house was packed, and we all want to thank Jackie Woods, Carol Holdren, Judy Bailey and Joan Connors for leading us through the types of judging we would encounter at shows or at a judging center and what we would need to do to prepare our plants for judging.

Jackie Woods helped us understand the two types of judging we would encounter: AOS flower quality judging and ribbon judging. When we bring a beautifully grown plant to a show, a ribbon is awarded by the sponsoring orchid society and is given for the best plant in that category. Thus, your plant might win "Best Phalaenopsis." An AOS Flower Quality Award (an AM or FCC for instance) is different, and is given to a plant by judging it against all plants of that grex or cross that have ever been awarded anywhere. The pool of "competitors" is much more extensive and the standards your plant must meet are more rigorous than those for a ribbon award.

Jackie explained the information we would need to provide to register our plant at a show or judging center. In addition to the name of the plant, e.g. BC Maikai, (if the plant does not have a name an AOS award would be provisional until the plant has been registered with RHS), the parents of that cross (C Bowringiana x B. nodosa), the clonal name, if any (for instance 'Louise'), and any awards that that clone has previously won (an AM/AOS) in this instance) are necessary for registration.

Carol Holdren and Judy Bailey provided us with the necessary procedures to groom our plants properly in order to present them in the best possible way for judging. Clearing the plant of debris, trimming away old sheaths and infloresences, cleaning the leaves with milk or lemon juice, staking so that flowers and growths look their best are critical steps when you are hoping to garner an award. Using a decorative pot, topping it off with some clean media or moss will enhance the final presentation of your orchid.

Our judges also briefly discussed how to create an orchid exhibit The main purpose of an exhibit is to present a group of attractively arranged orchids in a setting that follows the theme of a show. When putting together a display we should use other non-flowering plants as a back drop and frame for the orchid blooms and avoid items that are distracting. Natural items such as driftwood, stones or moss can enhance the natural flow of the design. Covering pots with moss or black cloth enables the viewer to focus on the flowers and black plant labels keeps distractions to a minimum. A natural flow of color, texture and variation in height and depth can draw a viewer in.

Joan then brought out her "bag of toys," important tools she has collected that she brings to shows to help her construct her displays: black duct tape, small lights, drift wood, dark green and flat black spray paint, a glue gun, pieces of wood, a hammer and staple gun should be at the ready when building an exhibit. Plant stands, extra pots and an appropriate backdrop all work together to help vary the height, depth, and placement of plants, working magic and providing a desired illusion. Just think of putting an exhibit together as creating a work of art!

Our FLOS members had ample opportunity to ask many questions, graciously answered by our guest judges. Our orchid education happily continues as we prepare for our Orchid Jubilee! (Rick Bellas)

This will be a great party! There is still time to make your reservations for the FLOS Holiday Party (see details on the invitation in the October and November Newsletters).




