



How to prepare orchids for judging

Our terrific Fort Lauderdale Orchid Show “Orchid Magic” is around the corner (January 9-11, 2026) at the Dodge Center in Pembroke Pines and this year we have expanded the monetary prizes available to hobbyists to almost all categories. This means

hobbyists could potentially collect up to \$2,000 in cash prizes spread over 20 categories please check the next page for details!

So, bring your plants.

They can be brought to the Dodge Center on **Thursday 1/8 from 3-7 PM** and can be retrieved at the closing on Sunday at 4 pm.

I will describe how to prepare and select your orchids for judging, but, first, I want to clarify the difference between “Ribbon Judging” and “AOS judging”.

“Ribbon Judging” is done monthly at most Orchid Societies and there are various iterations of it but for us it goes as follows:

- A “Green ribbon” is a cultural recognition that the plant is above average and very well grown.
- A “Blue ribbon” is the best in this category
- A “Red ribbon” is second position.
- Rarely do we use a “White ribbon” for 3rd place.

Ribbon judging will also happen for hobbyists’ plants at the Orchid Show.

Ribbon judging is a fun way to engage members and encourage to grow beautiful plants. There is no official registry besides the mention in the local newsletter. I remember the thrill of my first ribbon and have seen the thrill in many members’ eyes over the years.

“AOS judging” is a totally different ballgame. Judging is done by accredited judges who go through 6 years of apprenticeship and their criteria and demands are much higher.

Awarded plants need to stand out among their peers nationally & even internationally. Any award is officially recorded by the AOS until eternity, the plant gets a “clonal name” which is recognition of its superior status and that clonal name can only be used for a genetically identical plant (cloned or division). This is the big league! AOS judging happens all over the country at judging centers who usually meet once a month on a set day. Ours is the **West Palm Beach Judging Center which meets every 4th Saturday of the month** (except November and December when it is the third Saturday of the month) at Flamingo Gardens.

AOS judging also takes place during Orchid Shows and AOS judging will take place at our show right after the ribbon judging for hobbyists but all hobbyists plants are potentially eligible for review by the AOS judges for an award.

While there are different types of AOS awards, the most common ones are “flower quality awards”:
FCC = First Class Certificate with 90 points and over
AM = Award of Merit between 80 and 89 points
HCC = Highly Commended Certificate between 75 and 79 points

Preparing a plant for ribbon or AOS judging is similar but you have to be extra demanding for AOS judging.

1. Your plant cannot be diseased or infested with pests. Please check before bringing it to judging. Pests’ infestation cannot be resolved overnight and so if you notice the problem the day prior, treatment on the spot is likely not

enough to consider taking the plant to judging.

2. Cut off damaged leaves, spent flowers, old spikes etc.. Groom your plant!
3. Stake inflorescences if it makes sense but be careful when doing it. You want the flower to be presented well to the judges but if you stake it in an awkward position, you risk breaking the spike and it will also give a poor impression. Ideally, you should stake your spikes as they develop. This being said, a beautifully arching spike is a spectacle to behold and not all spikes need to be staked to be awarded.
4. Clean the leaves but do not use polishes that are sold commercially and make your leaves shine artificially. You can use diluted milk and lemon juice 50/50 with water and clean leaves that are dusty or have fungicide/pesticide dry spots.
5. For AOS judging (not for ribbon judging) you should cover ugly pots with decorative ones. You can use spanish moss (available at Home Depot) to cover the root ball if that increases the visual appeal.
6. For AOS judging, you should research previous awards if you are an AOS member. Included with your subscription is access to OrchidPro. Sometimes it looks like your plant is exceptional but it may be a plant that has many previous awards that have stretched the odds of new awards.

AOS Judging at Orchid Magic

Last year, at the orchid judging during our Orchid Show only 4 cash prizes were available to hobbyist. This year we have opened up almost every category (except 1 and 3) to commercial growers AND hobbyists.

This means that this year there are **\$2,000** available for prizes, available to hobbyists as well (whether they are a member of the Fort Lauderdale Orchid Society or not!)


This means LOTS more opportunity to win prizes and we encourage our members to bring plants to the show for judging.

The plants need to be dropped off on Thursday afternoon from 3 to 7 pm or Friday morning 7:30 am to 8:30 am and you can retrieve them on Sunday at 4 pm.

The following are the prize amounts and award descriptions:

1. \$50 - the most outstanding exhibit of orchids regardless of class, judged solely on artistic merit
2. \$200 - Grand Champion Flower (**Hobbyist**) in show.
3. \$100 - FLOS **Hobbyist** member for the best quality flower from any genus
4. \$100 - best species or hybrid Cattleya flower 10 cm (4") or larger.
5. \$100 - best species or hybrid Cattleya flower smaller than 10 cm (4").
6. \$100 - best species or hybrid Vanda flower (including syn. Ascocentrum), 7 cm (2.75") or larger.
7. \$100 - best species or hybrid Vanda flower (including syn. Ascocentrum), smaller than 7 cm (2.75").
8. \$100 - best Phalaenopsis species or hybrid 7 cm (2.75") or larger.
9. \$100 - best Phalaenopsis species or hybrid smaller than 7 cm (2.75").
10. \$100 - best species or hybrid flower in the Vanda alliance other than Vanda, (including syn. Ascocentrum) or Phalaenopsis.
11. \$100 - best Oncidinae species or hybrid.
12. \$100 - best Epidendrum, Encyclia or Prosthechea species or hybrid.
13. \$100 - best Dendrobium species or hybrid.
14. \$100 - best Bulbophyllum species or hybrid.
15. \$100 - best Brassavola species or hybrid.
16. \$100 - best Paphiopedilum species or hybrid
17. \$100 - best specimen plant in the show (any genus).
18. \$100 - best Miscellaneous genus orchid
19. \$100 - best Education display in show
20. The Oliver C. Munson Award (\$50) - best Vanda species or hybrid entered by a Hobby grower

countless growers, who treasure not only his award photographs but also the personal moments he captured with their plants. His ability to showcase the beauty of orchids through his lens was truly unmatched.

Tom recently retired from his long-held role as the WPBJC's primary photographer, and a celebratory party was held in his honor. In a perfect tribute to his passion, his retirement cake was crafted as an impressively accurate replica of a camera.

Tom's passing leaves a significant void for his loving companion Joan Connors and in the orchid community. He will be

deeply missed by orchid societies, AOS personnel, family, friends, and all who were fortunate enough to know him. We will remember his kindness, humor, and unwavering dedication to the art of orchid photography.

Angraecoids of South Africa

Editors Note - this excerpt was taken from an article written by Tom Kuligowski, originally published on Orchids.org almost 9 years ago, it has been edited for length.



Over the last fourteen years, I have had the opportunity to meet numerous people from all parts of the globe that have a passion for Angraecoids. Some in person and others via the internet. People such as Joyce Stewart, Johan Hermans and Bob Campbell; authors of "Angraecoid Orchids, Species from the African Region". Sarah Waddoups, the founder and CEO of the Angraecoid Alliance. An organization dedicated to the in-situ and ex-situ conservation of Angraecoid genera. Lisa Hillerman, the author of "An Introduction to the Cultivated Angraecoid Orchids of Madagascar"; she has shared much of her father's knowledge and photographs from his trips to Madagascar in the 1970s. Craig Morell, the horticulturalist from Pinecrest Gardens in Miami,

Florida; not only did I spark his interest in Angraecoids; but the knowledge I picked up from him is priceless. Alan Koch and Robert Fuchs, respected growers and accredited American Orchid Society (AOS) judges. The list goes on and on.

At this time, I'd like to introduce to my readers, Etienne Bosman (I met Etienne via this blog and the Facebook page). An orchid hobbyist that is very good at what he does and resides in South Africa being surrounded by the Angraecoid genera. The plants that are sought after for culture in our green houses in just about all corners of the world. This guest post will hopefully be the first in a series both he and I will be working on throughout the year. Sharing knowledge of both the natural habitats and cultures from the southern and the northern hemispheres. Please welcome Etienne Bosman.

"And I have thought, that as orchids are universally acknowledged to rank amongst the most singular and most modified forms in the vegetable kingdom, the facts to be presently given might lead some observers to look more curiously into the habitats of our several native species." – Charles Darwin

And so I looked curiously into the habitats of our several native species. I must say it did take some time to do just that. Unlike most of the Angraecoid growers around the world; I am fortunate enough to be living in an area that numerous Angraecoids call home.

Just 350 km north from Pretoria in the Limpopo Province, South Africa; lays the Magoebaskloof Pass. One of the great classic passes of Limpopo and one of the most scenic passes in the country. This pass takes you from the High Veld (Escarpment) to the Low Veld traveling in a northeastern direction; descending 446 vertical meters from a summit of 1400 m ASL.

Magoebaskloof is part of the Limpopo Mistbelt forest; and very often, due to thick mist, the indigenous forest will not be readily visible while driving through the pass. Mistbelt forests are confined to higher altitude, soil, southern slopes of mountains. This provides reduced radiation and longer lasting moisture on the forest floor. These aspects combined with the temperate climate provides ideal growing conditions for orchids.

Preparing your collection for winter

Growing Orchids With Olivier

Editors note: This article was originally published in the Dec 2021 issue of the FLOS newsletter.

Winter arrives on Dec. 21. I have a routine for many aspects of my orchids' care because it is the best way to avoid slacking. That routine changes with the seasons, but especially during winter.

The days are the shortest, providing a lot less light needed for our orchids to grow. The temperatures are the lowest of the year, which means many orchids will go dormant or reduce their growth altogether. Vandas and Phals and many hybrids typically grow year-round, but even for them the pace of growth slows dramatically.

This means that fertilizing is a lot less important in January and February. I do not fertilize any plant that is dormant like some Cattleya species, many Dendrobium species, my dormant Catasetums etc. Cattleya hybrids usually grow year-round, so I continue fertilizing them, but at much lower rates. January is statistically our coldest month and avoiding fertilizing

in January is not a bad idea.

If you have plants that are growing well but not blooming, the odds are that they need more light. Winter is the perfect time of the year to increase light exposure as they will have time to gradually adjust to higher sunlight levels by exposing them to the weakest sun of the year now. You can't do that in the summer when the sun is at its harsh and most ruthless.


As a general rule, I water my plants a lot less in the winter, too. Keeping track of overnight temperatures is important. Orchids with wet feet on cold nights is a recipe for disaster as they can quickly develop pathogens. When I hear that we will have temperatures below 55 degrees, I make sure my orchids have a medium that is dry or near dry when the time comes. So, check the weather forecast nightly so you can protect your plants. (Find more information on cold sensitive orchids in my article in the [November 2021 newsletter](#) available online at FLOS.org.)

I do not repot in winter. Repotting is always a stressful exercise for any

orchid and they need to be ready to establish themselves quickly after repotting. In winter, most are half asleep or totally dormant and so repotting during these months can be fatal. It is the worst time of the year to repot. Some of your plants may have to be moved around. I put my dormant Catasetums and my Den. aggregatum, Den. anosmum as well as my Laelia anceps, C. tenuis underneath an overhang where no rain can hit them. Some species need higher light in the winter to mimic their natural environment as the tree canopy may let more light shine through during that time. You have to research your own species' needs to determine that.

Bottom line: You will have a lot less work overall to do on your orchids this time of the year.
